Call to Order

Land Acknowledgement

4. Business Arising as a Result of the Minutes

5. Special Education Update

ESS Staffing Re-organization Update

M. Wilcox has met with several other boards and this issue seems to be impacting many boards across the province. We continue to work with Human Resources and Education Support Staff union partners to hire.

Camp Discover/Stride Update

The focus participants for **Camp Discovery** were students with a RISE profile formally identified with a Learning Disability or Mild Intellectual Disability.

Goals included:

- Supporting student wellbeing and mindfulness
- Developing oral language skills
- ▶ Reading intervention using explicit and systematic instruction
- Promote caregiver education about learning challenges
- Building social skills
- ▶ Enrich learning with STEAM activities
- Provide support to prevent COVID/summer slide

Data was collected between initial, midway, and final assessments and was shared with the SEAC committee.

The focus participants for **Camp Stride** were students with a GAINS profile which included students with development delays and students with autism.

Goals included:

- Supporting student wellbeing
- Maintaining consistency in routines
- Building caregiver partnerships
- Promoting caregiver education
- Providing enriched STEAM activities
- ▶ Promoting language/math through music and movement
- Supporting transition back to their brick and mortar school for September 2021
- ▶ Maintaining skills developed from 2020/21 virtual school
- Maintaining communication skills developed to date
- Providing ongoing social interaction opportunities for students who would normally not attend summer camps.

The Camp was very well received and parent feedback was positive. Responses from parent feedback indicated that all felt the program met or exceeded expectations.

• FNMI Empower Tutoring Update

- ▶ In September, two teachers (tutors) were trained in Empower by Sick Kid's Hospital staff. Kits were purchased for the two tutors.
- ▶ A list of students from Aspen who self-identified as Indigenous and are currently in Grade 7 or 8 was compiled.
- Principals were asked to work with their LSTs/Special Education Coordinators/Classroom teachers to determine which students were potential candidates.
- ▶ Parents/caregivers were contacted by school principals and asked to commit to the after school tutoring program.
- We are expecting to have the Empower Tutoring Program up and running in the next two weeks.

Special Education PD Update

Empower Refresher Training

All LSTs who facilitated Empower were provided with a refresher session to support them given the interruption to face to face learning over the last 18 months.

GAINS TEAMS Resources

This session explored the teaching resources available on our Microsoft TEAMS platform to support GAINS teachers in the event we need to pivot to remote learning

► EDSBY Report Card Training for STEPS and GAINS Teachers

EDBSY is a learning management software system for teachers to communicate with parents and students, store assessment and evaluation data and compiles data analytics. Individual Education Plans (IEPs), annual goals and expectations were reviewed as well as reporting expectations and report card comments for the alternative report card.

Science of Reading (SOR)

Working in partnership with the Program Department, we have begun the Science of Reading (SOR) PD sessions to build educator capacity to teach reading based on evidence-based research from SOR. All primary classroom teachers, Learning Support Teachers, ESL Teachers, RISE Teachers and Early Childhood Educators will attend 4 half day PD sessions developed by a multi-disciplinary team of Program Consultants, Special Education Consultants, Speech and Language Pathologists and Psychological Services staff. All classroom teachers will be provided with literacy kits to support the implementation of reading interventions in their classrooms.

Lexia for Administrators

All elementary principals and vice-principals attended a professional development session provided by Lexia Core5 trainers. The focus of the session for administrators included how to "dig deeper" on the Lexia Core5 dashboard to further understand the literacy needs of students in their buildings.

6. New Business

The focus within the board this year has been on Equity and Diversity. T. DiCastro, Program Consultant, suggested a video to share which will be viewed at the November 2021 SEAC meeting.

Pediatric Caregiver Group

This is a group for parents & caregivers of children who have an acquired brain injury. The child must be between the ages of 6 to 18 for the parent/caregiver to attend. The group will be led by a social worker and is free to attend.

Meetings are held the **2**nd **Wednesday of each month at 7:00pm via zoom**. The meetings will run about 1 to 1.5 hours. We are hoping that in person meetings will start in January 2022. There will be child care available in another room while parents meet.

There are no other groups in the Windsor-Essex area addressing this need for parents of children with an ABI to meet and talk. This group is unique in that it provides an opportunity for children's caregivers to feel less lonely, isolated or judged, thereby reducing distress, depression, anxiety or fatigue. It provides an opportunity to talk opening and honesty about feelings in a non-judgmental atmosphere, to stay motivated to manage the symptoms of brain injury; gain a sense of empowerment, control and hope; improve their understanding of brain injury, get practical feedback about treatment options and learn about health, economic and social resources including school.

Supports help people to learn about additional resources, learn from people who understand their situation and provide emotional support – to feel they are not alone. This helps in recovery and prevents more serious mental health issues.
