While we cannot accept requests for specific teachers, we do try to grant requests that are based on the learning needs of our students. All requests must be made in writing, dated and signed, prior to May 12th, 2023. If you have made the same request in a previous year and it is still relevant, please make the request again this year. Please note that all class placements are TENTATIVE until after reorganization day in September.

In 2013, history was made with April proclaimed as Sikh Heritage Month by the Legislative Assembly of Ontario (Bill 52). The first of its kind in the world, Sikh Heritage Month is a celebration of arts, culture and heritage.

For more than 125 years, the Sikh community has made immense contributions to the social, economic, political and cultural fabric of our country. This month gives us the opportunity to celebrate these accomplishments and educate future generations about them.

Since the arrival of the first Sikh immigrants in the late 19th century, this community
has helped make Canada a more diverse and inclusive society. With more than 500,000 members of the Sikh community here in our country, Canada is the proud home to one of the largest Sikh diasporas in the world.

The values of equality, humility, generosity and compassion are core principles of Sikhism. In fact, these values will be also highlighted during Vaisakhi later this month. We invite everyone to celebrate and learn about the culture and history of Sikh communities here in Canada throughout April and beyond.

Easter is one of the principal holidays, or feasts, of Christianity. For many Christian churches, Easter is the joyful end to the Lenten season of fasting and penitence. Canadians commonly refer to Easter as the period from Good Friday through Easter Monday. Good Friday (and /or Easter Monday) is a statutory holiday in Canada. Easter is the first Sunday after the first full moon following the vernal equinox, and thus takes place between 22 March and 25 April. For many Christians, the celebration of Easter is preceded by Lent, a 40 -day period of penance that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday.
Orthodox Christians in Europe, Africa and the Middle East celebrate Easter later than most in the western world. It's because they use a different calendar to work out what day Easter should fall on.
Some of the symbols we associate with modern Easter have more to do with spring than with religion, and hearken back to the traditions of ancient peoples. Eggs, chicks, flowers and rabbits are all related to spring and to the renewal of life after winter.


Passover (Pesach) is Judaism's spring ritual commemorating the Israelites'
liberation from slavery in Egypt, as told in the Haggadah. The celebration is one of three pilgrim festivals and lasts up to eight days.
Passover is held from the 15 th to the 21 st day of the seventh month of the Hebrew year. It begins at sundown on the day before the first full day specified for the holiday. None of the Passover days are statutory holidays in Canada, though Jewish businesses and organizations may close or work restricted hours during Passover (see National Holidays). Passover often coincides with Easter.
Jewish families in Canada celebrate Passover much as people do around the world, with food and family gatherings. The first and last day are particularly important, and include special blessings and prayers, attending a synagogue or read from the Torah, and eating a ceremonial meal.
